N. news in 11 languages, it is distributing 1,600 sets of a special kit of broadcasting scripts on the assembly and has taken special kit of broadcasting scripts on the assembly and has taken part in production of a half-hour dramatic documentary program which will be heard throughout the world.

The Prench, Spanish, Chinese and Russian sections of the radio division also are preparing to broadcast adaptations of one of the U.N. programs which will be offered in transcriptions to stations unable to relay the original broadcast. The two services most widely relayed, because of the high quality of reception, are those in Spanish (to Luth America) and in Chinese. The programs all carry the latest news on work of the assembly and other United Nations bedies, interviews with delegates, background talks, recorded excepts from a Speciela in debate and short features.
