

**More Hunters Get Deer With Bow And Arrow**

Getting a deer with bow and arrow has become such commonplace news in Michigan that accurate tallies no longer may be kept of the archers' score, but conservation department game men estimate upwards of 50 deer were taken in the first two weeks of the season.

The take increased rapidly after deer and fawns became legal targets in 17 northern counties October 11, but archers were setting bucks in such southern counties as Montcalm, Ionia and Tuscola also. Some bolder bowmen tackled bears, and reports indicated at least three had been bagged already.

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**1946 Woodcock Take Best On Record**

Last year's woodcock shooting was the best on record, and game men of the conservation department already are predicting the shooting this year will equal or surpass that of 1946.

The little "timber doodles" are found mostly in low, wet lands in swales or among people or tag alder, and it is the partridge hunter that usually comes upon them, though they are a migratory bird whose taking is described by federal regulations under "duck hunting" rules. The birds are esteemed for the table, and for their erratic flight which makes them a difficult target. Heavy undergrowth and heavy foliage make more than average skill needed to hunt them successfully this month.

The state's woodcock bag last season was nearly 70,000. The brief season, already over in the upper peninsula, ends October 29 in southern Michigan. The daily bag is four, the possession limit eight.

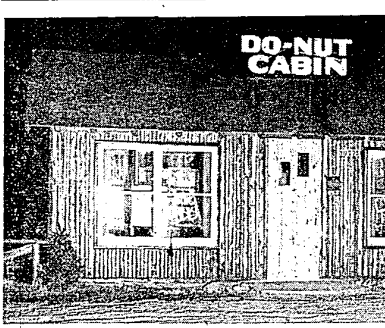

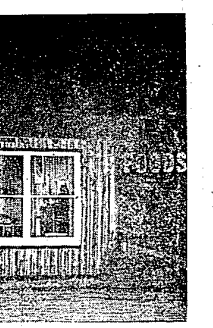
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
