find leaders, assistant leaders and troop committee women, and to find the new troop as soon as it is formed. They must also fill all vacancies whenever they occur.

Three years ago there were seven troops under the Farmington Girl Scout Council. Today there are sixteen, five of which were started this fall. All of the troops have a sponsor. The Baptist Church is sponsoring three troops, the Methodist Church is sponsoring two troops and the Evangelical Church is sponsoring one troop. The V.F.W. also sponsors a troop, the Noble P.T.A. sponsors a five troop in the Scout Council. The Bond Club sponsors the Intermediate Scout troop in the Bond District.

One new troop which was just started in Farmington is a Ninth Grade Senior Troop. This is the first time there has ever been a separate troop for ninth graders, apart from the older Senior Scouts, and from all reports this is going to be one of the busiest troops. They have a full year planned.

There are approximately 75 women now working with our troops as leaders, assistant leaders and committee women, but if we are to continue the growth of Girl Scouting, more women are needed. Mrs. Sovereign has been a Board member for five years and with her experience and background, is a good authority in asking women who can give a little spare time, to come forward either in helping out a troop, or on the board. Mothers of daughters from 7 to 16 years of age should be especially interested, as it is for the welfare of these girls that Scouting must continue to grow. If the mothers are not interested enough to help, others cannot be expected to volunteer their services. Some of the best workers are busy mothers with small children.

The positions on the Board take very little time away from home. If you do not have the time to be a leader, there is a place for you on the Board. All these jobs are very important to keep the troops functioning properly.

The present workers are hoping that after all the positions on the Board are made familiar in the articles appearing in "The Enterprise", many women will come forward to offer their help in carrying on the Girl Scout program in Farmington, in whatever position they feel they would be most capable of. A training course is now being given for leaders, and in the near future training will be given for Board members.
