National Forests Safe
The national forests include 75 million acres capable of growing commercial timber crops, says a report of the U. S. forest service. They include one-third of the national sawtimber stand. They are being managed for continuous timber production. In recent years the national forests have supplied about 10 per cent of the nation's total lumber cut. Eventually, their total sustained-yield output of timber can be more than doubled.
