IMPORTANT IN
GRAIN SAVING

If your barn or granary harbors rats, you're giving protection to a robber and waster of grain. It is estimated that rats do an average of 63 million dollars worth of damage on farms each year.

D. W. Hayne, zoologist at Michigan State college, advises ratproof buildings as the best method of control. But if your granary isn't rat proofed there are a number of methods to cut down the rat population.

Red squill is a poison which has the advantage of being less dangerous to human beings, farm pets and livestock, and is effective to use when the grain may ultimately be used for feed. Red squill can be obtained at stores handling farm supplies. Directions for use should be followed carefully.

While not a substitute for sanitation and rat-proofing, gas is effective in killing rats. Rat burrows in the open may be gassed by piping the exhaust of a car or tractor into the holes. Since carbon monoxide is deadly, use of exhaust gas is safe only when you are in the open air. Do not inhale the exhaust.

Calcium cyanide or "cyanogas" treats rat burrows effectively by giving off fumes slowly. Calcium cyanide should not be used for rat control in rainy or wet weather, since the fumes are given off rapidly enough to endanger the worker. The dust will not harm the grain for eventual use but time should be allowed for all of the fumes to escape.

Traps, probably the oldest rat control, will help to keep down the excess rats. Trapping boxes or artificial runways will also trap weasels and ground squirrels.

COUNTY CATTLE
TO SHOW AT
CHICAGO EXPOSITION

Michigan's exhibits at the 1947 International Stock Exhibition and Horse Show will include a show herd of 14 purebred Aberdeen Angus cattle owned by Howard L. McGregor, of Rochester, Oakland county.

The Exposition will be held in Chicago at the Union Stock Yards November 29 to December 6. It will be the 45th annual renewal of this largest of the country's live stock shows.

Officials of the Exposition predict one of the largest shows in its history of this event by the time all entries are tabulated following their closing on November 1. They anticipate a showing of 12,000 head of beef cattle, draft horses, and ponies, sheep and swine.

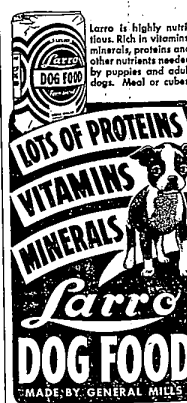
This year will mark the 25th anniversary of the International Grain and Hay Show, one of the largest competitive crop exhibits in the world. A 50 per cent increase in the cash premiums for this division is announced for this year's competition. Entries for the grain and hay classes will be accepted until November 10.

Daily Horse Shows will be the chief entertainment feature. They are scheduled every evening of the eight day run of the Exposition and on five afternoons.

Insures Profits

Farmers with stored wheat stand to lose money if they allow the grain to become moldy or musty, points out Dr. John Vaughn, extension plant pathologist at Michigan State college. Millers frequently turned down musty grain and it may not be good for cattle if the molds are toxic.

The must or mold develops when the wheat has been stored when damp or if it gets damp while in storage. A lack of ventilation is important in development of the mold. Wheat must be caused by the same fungi or molds that develop on bread or cloth when stored in damp, airless places.

Since there is no chemical treatment for must, wheat should be kept dry and ventilated.

DHIA No. 1 Shows
Outstanding Record

Oakland County Dairy Herd Improvement Association No. 1 had an outstanding record of production for the month of September. George Fisher, Association Supervisor reports that this association was second highest in the average butterfat production for all associations in the State for the month of September being topped only by Shiawassee County No. 1 DHIA.

Fisher's Association average for 25 herds was 30.5 lbs. of butterfat per cow, while Shiawassee No. 1 Association had 31.1 lbs. of butterfat per cow.
