FARMINGTON WOMEN ACTIVE IN COUNTY GIRL SCOUT WORK

Rotary presidents throughout the county met with Oakland County Girl Scout officials on October 23 to discuss financial aid to this group under whose jurisdiction fall all Girl Scouts in Oakland County. With the exception of the present Pontiac and Royal Oak areas, this Girl Scout Committee was organized in November, 1944, under the County War Chest, County Girl Scout membership has increased in that time from 1,150 to 2,934. Through Mrs. Edward L. Ruslander, Executive Director, the Committee has provided Girl Scout Leadership Training Courses, Day Camps for Scouts of all ages in various localities throughout the county, and generally extended the program in former unorganized areas.

Since the discontinuance of the County War Chest, and the present lack of any Red Feather organization in the County, this Oakland County Girl Scout Committee has been without financial aid, and is forced to seek help from groups interested in youth activities, or close its office in the Birmingham Theater Building, thus depriving the girls of present services, and curtailing future growth in this world wide program which this year celebrates its 35th birthday.

Rotary President Peter Hammett of Lake Orion is taking an active part in interesting other Rotarians and all other service clubs in this character building program.
