**FARM FEATURES****Dairymen Advised To Keep Cows Stabled At Night**

With cooler nights here, dairymen should keep cows stabled, advises Ed Alchin, assistant county agricultural agent. Cold, wet days will cause cows to stand around outdoors with their backs humped up and tails tucked between their legs, probably wondering where to go to get their next bite of food.

Under such conditions, cows are better off in the stable. While keeping cows in the stable will require a little extra work, agents believe that it will pay off in milk returns because of the better feeding that can be done, more comfort for cows, and the lessened danger of mastitis and udder infection. It is common for cows who lie out all night to come up in the morning with caked quarters and swollen bags brought on by exposure of the udders to the cold ground.

A. C. Baitzer, extension dairyman at Michigan State College, advises this grain ration: 700 pounds of cereal, 100 to 150 pounds of either 24 per cent or 32 per cent protein concentrate mixture.

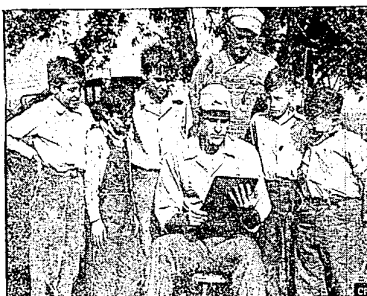
Permitting cows outdoors under bright, sunny fall days is all right, providing regular barn feeding conditions are carried on.

Cows should be fed one pound of grain daily for the total pounds of fat produced in a week. For example, a cow giving 40 pounds of four percent milk would produce ten pounds of fat per week and should receive ten pounds of grain daily.

According to past records, November is usually the lowest month in terms of pounds of milk per day. Feeding cows hay, silage and grain will tend to reduce this drop in milk production.

**Uses of Straw**

Straw, our most important crop residue, now is going into wider industrial use. In recent years there has been a particularly noticeable expansion to use of processed straw, mostly for making cigarette papers, straw board and for producing high quality writing paper. In other countries it is used to make bricks, thatching roofs, as a substitute for timber and for making mats, bags and wearing apparel, for fuel and for many other household uses.

**County Horses To Show At Chicago**

Meadow Brook Farms, Rochester, owned by Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Will, will be among the prominent Michigan farms that will be represented by exhibits at the 1947 International Live Stock Exposition and Horse Show.

They have listed entries for the purebred Belgian draft horse classes of the show and will also exhibit a six-horse team of this breed at the International Horse Show. Their six-in-hand won't test in the team competition at the International Exposition last year.

A. Y. Knoblock, a pure-bred Aberdeen-Angus cattle breeder of this county, has entered a show herd of 10 head of this breed he is sending from his farm near Clyde.

The International will celebrate its 48th anniversary November 29 to December 6. It will be held in the International Amphitheatre at the Chicago Stock Yards.

Officials of the show predict one of the largest Expositions in the history of this event by the time all entries are tabulated following their closing on November 1. They anticipate a showing of 12,000 head of beef cattle, draft horses, light horses and ponies, sheep and swine.

Dalley Horse Shows will be the chief entertainment feature. They are scheduled every evening of the eight day run of the Exposition and on five afternoons.

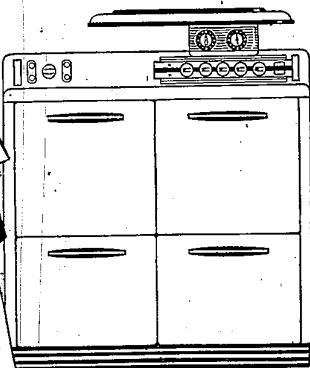
