Safer Hydrants

hydrants to a 4 1/2 inch hookup. The hydrants, which have three spigots each, were not putting out the total volume of water of which they are capable. Two of the outlets will remain at the present diameter of 2 1/2 inches.

THE THIRD and main outlet is being enlarged so the gallons per minute rating will be at a maximum, matching the capability of the water lead-in to the hydrant.

"We also have to be concerned with the water pressure," Jones said. "It changes from season to season. In winter, pressure varies from 40 to 100 pounds. But in the summer, people use more water, and the pressure goes down to 20 to 40 pounds," Jones explained. "At 20 pounds of pressure, the old two-inch fitting could put out 750 gallons per minute. With the four-inch adapter, the same hydrant at that pressure puts out 1,600 gallons per minute, and, at 60 pounds, a smaller fitting will deliver 1,300 gallons while a four-inch will bring forth 3,300 gallons per minute, Jones continued.

THE FOREMAN of the water and sewer division, John Overfield, came up with the idea of bolting the hydrant to the larger coupling to the hydrant "bonnet."

By drilling holes through the coupling into the hydrant itself, and plugging them with filed off bolts, "it keeps the fitting from coming off the spigot (cover)," Overfield said.

Sixty hydrants need to be changed over to the larger size, dubbed the "national standard thread," and Farmington is one of the first cities in the state to do so.

Jones said that, with the use of the larger fittings, the Old Village area along Grand River will have five times the fire protection it has had. With future installation of new hydrants with the new fittings, the total protection will go up 10 times what it is now, he explained.

"We are doing this now within the budget for this year," he said, "but putting in new hydrants for the added protection will take more money" that will have to come from a new budget or someplace else, Jones completed.

The cost for the original die cast of the larger coupling was \$50 and \$37 for each one after that, but a new hydrant costs \$450 to put in the ground, he said.

Cityhood Campaign To Begin

FARMINGTON The cityhood campaign for Farmington Township will be organized during a special meeting sponsored by the Future Farmington Association (FFA) beginning at 8 p.m. on Monday, April 17.

The meeting will be held in the cafeteria of East Junior High of Farmington Schools on Middle Belt between 10 and 11 Mile Rds.

The FFA board has agreed to keep cityhood campaign efforts at a low key until after the April 21 school mileage election to avoid interference with that outcome.

Invited to the meeting are all FFA members, all charter commission candidates and interested residents.

The FFA is the group which originally petitioned for the incorporation vote which will be held May 16. The question asks for joining all sections of Farmington Township and the villages of Wood Creek Farms and Quakertown into a home-rule city.

If the question receives a "yes" vote, a nine-member charter commission will begin meeting to write a charter for the new city. Cityhood becomes effective once residents approve a charter.
