

Kaleidoscope Abounds With Attractions

Just as the talents and contributions of many people went into the development and creation of Michigan Artrain, so has the Kaleidoscope Plymouth arts festival brought forth coordinated effort and enthusiasm of Plymouthites in general to turn the Artrain visit into a true "happening."

"A new awareness of each other and what we each contribute to the joy of life is taking place, from the very young to our lively senior citizens," comments Mrs. Ray (Jo) Hulce, Kaleidoscope coordinator.

She points to the cooperation of business leaders in developing a site beautification program as one case in point, and finds further evidence of widespread community involvement in the activities which will surround the Artrain stay of 18 days.

MRS.
