Religion Update

While there has been a welcome increase in cooperation between religious denominations, clergy and congregations throughout the nation should take careful note of a growing number of bogue clergy from obscure denominations who take advantage of this ecumenicity — such as Robert Douglas Tato.

On Oct. 28, 1968, Tato, who still claims to be a priest of the Antiochian Orthodox Archdiocese of Toledo, Ohio and Dependencies in North America, was arrested by police in Zanesville, Ohio, on child molesting charges.

Photostatic copies of these police records, which are now in the files of this writer, reveal that Tato obtained employment as a caseworker in Muskingum County including charges of fraud, assault on a minor male child and repeated violations of the Selective Service law.

In February of 1971, The San Francisco Examiner first exposed Tato for identifying himself as "Father Robert Richards" and falsely claiming to be a Roman Catholic priest — while operating a homosexual commune called the "Community of St. John The Beloved" and holding services (until forbidden by campus authorities) at the Jesuit-owned University of San Francisco.

One year later, The Examiner, in another page-one story, revealed that newly elected San Francisco Sheriff Richard Hongisto had

pointed Tato a chaplain of the San Francisco County Jail.

SHERIFF HONGISTO reacted to this expose by angrily denouncing the story as "trash" and by barring this writer from covering the announced worship services which Tato said he was conducting in the jail. The controversy reached the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, with Supervisor Peter Tamara raising the issue of the freedom of the press and asking the sheriff what he was trying to hide.

But when subsequently confronted with the Zanesville police records, which this writer traveled to Zanesville to obtain, Sheriff Hongisto immediately barred Tato from the jail, admitting somewhat sheepishly that he had not known of the police record.

Tato admits he jumped bail in Zanesville, where, after his failure to return, the charge was finally dropped on Feb. 9, 1970. He loftily dismisses this charge as "typical harassment of homosexuals" — which should be of particular note to the vast majority of homosexuals who never touch children, but who suffer because of those who do.

This should also be carefully noted by the nation's clergy (not to mention sheriffs and welfare departments) who can consult Zanesville police records for the extensive and tragic statement of a 13-year-old boy who was apparently unaware of the existence of wolves in priest's clothing.
