Fellowship Winner Is Livonia AAUW Speaker

Members of the American Association of University Women Livonia branch will both raise funds and get a first-hand view of how AAUW money is used at their meeting Tuesday, April 18.

The gathering at 8 p.m. in St. Paul Presbyterian Church, 2475 Five Mile, Livonia, will feature a silent auction to benefit the AAUW Fellowship Fund and a talk by Miriam Yu of Hong Kong, who is studying on an AAUW grant.

Livonia members have been working on "make it, bake it, grow it or sew it" items for the auction, and these will be sold during the monthly meeting.

Then they will have a chance to meet Miss Yu, who is a graduate student in behavioral sciences and education at the University of Michigan.

BORN IN CHINA, she received her BA degree from Lingnan University in Canton and has studied at the University of Hong Kong and at the Seaford College of Education in Sussex, England.

She earned a master's degree in guidance and counseling from the University of Michigan, and now is a doctoral candidate there, planning to teach at the college level in the field of human development and personality.

Miss Yu is a world traveler, a lecturer in parent education and an amateur Chinese painter. While carrying a full load of graduate studies, she also gives frequent lectures and demonstrations to many groups to learn about American people and culture

and to introduce Chinese culture to Americans.

MISS YU is one of 83 women from the United States and 50 women from 30 countries around the world who have been awarded nearly \$481,000 in stipends and tuition for advanced study and research.

Regular AAUW fellowships aid American women who wish to study in this country or abroad, and AAUW international fellowships go only to promising women from countries other than America to pursue graduate study or to do research in universities in the United States.

Camp Midicha, which will receive all proceeds from the benefit, is usually the only camp that diabetic youngsters can attend. It provides close medical supervision so that children can enjoy a well-rounded recreational program.

The camp also offers education and training in diet control, self-testing for the body's sugar level and the giving of daily insulin shots.

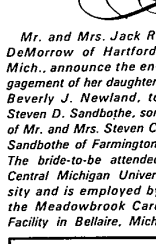
DIANNE KLUG

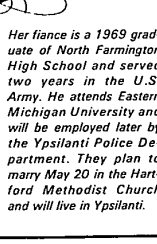
MARJORIE ZIEGLER
