Playing Cards Introduced
While there is evidence as far back as 800 A. D. that cards were popular in Hindistan there is evidence that they were in use in Egypt in the time of Joseph and appeared among the Jews after their return from the Babylonian exile. National Forests Safe
The national forests include 73 million acres capable of growing commercial timber crops, says a report of the U. S. forest service. They include one-third of the national saw-timber stand. They are being managed for continuous timber production. In recent years the national forests have supplied about 10 per cent of the nation's yearly lumber cut. Eventually, their total sustained-yield output of timber can be more than doubled.

Man Pleads Guilty To Grand Larceny

William Kleist, 29520 Edgewood, has entered a plea of guilty to charges of grand larceny and has been bound over to Circuit Judge, following arraignment and posting of \$1,000 bail. He has been committed to jail since bail was not furnished.

Mr. Kleist was an employee of Hutton's Farmington Hardware. Upon a complaint signed by Mr. Hutton, a warrant for his arrest and a search warrant were issued. Police made a search of his home and recovered wool shirts and socks, sweaters, tools, electrical supplies and other merchandise which he had taken from the hardware store during the month he worked there. Some merchandise which Kleist had sold was also recovered.
