## Michigan Out-Of-Doors

Conservation department hunting license receipts gained momentum in November, as the number of resident small game licenses accounted for rose from 44 per cent less than last year's at the month's beginning to 25 per cent less than last year's at the month's end.

To December 1, 412,477 resident small game licenses were reported sold. Late returns are expected to raise this figure again considerably.

With perhaps one-fourth of the resident deer hunting license sales accounted for, the number sold was 21 per cent less than was sold at this time a year ago. A flurry of late license sales makes an estimate of the total deer hunting license sales impossible at this time, conservation department officials say.

In both small game and deer seasons the decline was greater among non-resident than among resident hunters.

Sport fishing license sales established a record when they passed the million mark for the first time in Michigan history. To December 1, residents bought 746,042 and non-residents bought 266,262 licenses to fish in Michigan waters. To date this season the conservation department has issued less than half as many trapping licenses as were issued up to this time a year ago.

Because of the big sales of fishing licenses and increased fees for other licenses, total hunting, trapping and fishing license income in the first 11 months of the year is 13 1/2 per cent greater than in 1946.

That much heralded decline in the waterfowl population failed to appear in Michigan, Herb Miller, specialist, concludes in a post-season view of 1947 duck hunting. The decline had been forecast on a continental basis, but in both local and flight ducks Michigan had a few more birds than last year, rather than less. The increase was noted mainly on larger lakes in the southern part of the state, Miller says.

The near-normal supply of ducks furnished a relatively small kill, however, as freakish hot calm weather kept most ducks rafted, safely out of gunners' range in shooting hours.

Late flights made the post season population, as checked by aerial surveys, higher than the mid-season population, and geese appeared in numbers only with the storms that followed the season's close.

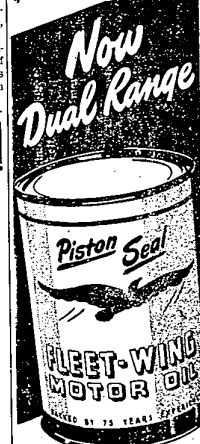

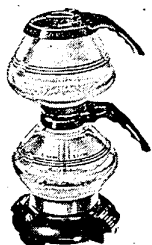
