This program got under way last week with the 7th and 8th grade teams of Farmington traveling to Northville for their first game. Coach-Ernie McBride is in charge of the two teams in Farmington. They will play one game with each of the schools in the Inter-Lakes Conference.

Farmington's 7th grade squad had little difficulty defeating Northville last Friday, winning by the score of 21 to 11. The Farmington starting lineup consists of Doyle Nichols and John Covart, forwards; Milt Garner, center; Denver Nichols and Jack Gatzley, guards. Doyle Nichols was high point man for the Farmington team with six points followed by Dick Tyler with five points.

In the eighth grade contest Farmington also won easily, taking Northville to the tune of 23 to 13. The starting lineup for this game was as follows: Bob Hutton and Dean Whitehead, forwards; Jeno Carnevale, center; Bob Hammond and John Nuss, guards. Dean Whitehead was the high point man for the winners, being credited with 12 points.
