Detailed Plans To Be Submitted To State

Initial action on the Farmington Township School District's building program was taken by the Board of Education Monday evening at its regular meeting at the office of its superintendent in the Farmington High School.

In a formal motion the Board retained the services of Berry and Stevens, attorneys, "for the purpose of putting into effect and bringing to completion the issuance of bonds authorized by the voters of the District at the special election held December 6, 1947."

WORKING ON PLANS Superintendent O. E. Dunckel stated that Mr. Frederick Madison, school architect, was working on detailed plans for the three school units. He added that a great many details of planning and construction must be worked out before final plans can be approved.

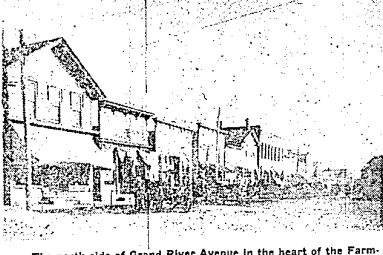

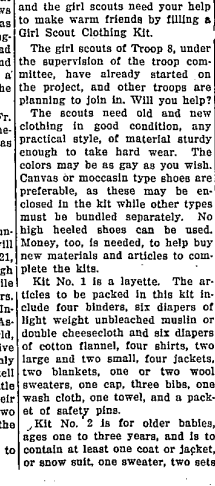
