No date has been set for the wedding.



at 23315 Grand River Avenue. Mr. Donnelly had made a survey of residences in the neighborhood, and the results showed that no objections were registered to the granting of such a license.
Members of the Board discussed at some length the status of the suit which has been filed against the Township by holders of the Township Water Department. Reply to the suit has been filed by the Township, and a hearing will be held some time in February, but the exact date has not yet been established.
The matter of fire insurance on the Township property was discussed. Kenn Loomis, present at the meeting, volunteered to have an appraisal of the building made, to determine its present valuation, and the insurance can then be adjusted accordingly.
The board voted to increase insurance on office equipment and furniture to \$1,825, since some new equipment has recently been added, and present insurance is not adequate.
Virgil Campbell brought to the Board's attention the matter of improved fire department protection for the Township. It was agreed that some further fire fighting equipment is needed, and the possibility of housing equipment at the eastern end of the Township was also proposed. Further investigation will be made before any definite steps are taken.

The poor dogs around the countryside have had slim pickin's for the customers have been grabbin' off all the soup bones.
