## Incentive Awards Offered

Women planning to attend Wayne State University as part-time students next fall may apply now for incentive scholarships offered by Women of Wayne Alumni.

Forms, available at Alumni House on the Wayne State campus, must be returned by May 15.

Applicants should be between the ages of 25 and 55 and must complete university admission requirements for study toward a bachelor or graduate degree. There is no restriction on the field of study.

Last year 21 women received grants.

The Women of Wayne incentive scholarship program was one of the first in the nation designed to assist part-time students. It is supported entirely by voluntary contributions from Wayne alumnae and friends.

Women of Wayne also sponsors a loan fund for full-time students and operates a child care center on the campus.
