In their place, Pittsburgh multiple bullet-resistant glass has been used, which in addition to affording protection to bank personnel against bandit's guns, does not in any way detract from the dignity and beauty of the bank's appearance. A two-way driver is provided at the bottom of the window for the interchange of business.

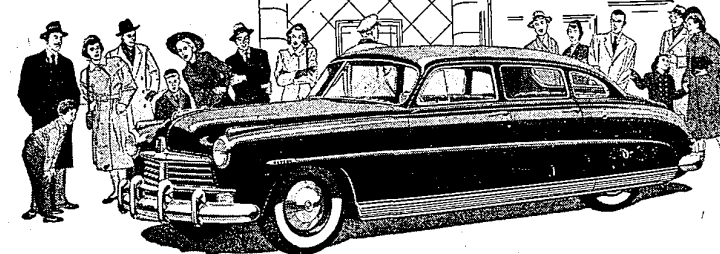
