FATHER-SON TEAMS
TAKE HONORS AT
FARMERS' WEEK

Farmers' Week, held recently at Michigan State college, pointed up the fact that father-and-son farm partnerships are important to Michigan's agriculture and generally mean a successful farming venture.

Father-and-son partnerships walked off with top honors in most livestock competition. Fenton Perkins and his son, Stanley, of Swartz Creek, got the grand championship for their Shorthorn steer, Broad Blade. This is the sixth generation of the Perkins family breeding Shorthorns.

Top award, the grand championship, for both single animal and pen of three in the swine show went to A. L. Barnhart, Reading, and his son-in-law, Clarence Babel, who farm in partnership. Barnhart's son, Martin, got reserve champion honors for his pen of Chester Whites.

In the sheep competition, Ralph Denmore, Granger, County, and his two sons, Max 12 and Harry 17, took top honors. From 26 grade and pure-bred Oxford ewes, they raised 51 lambs which averaged 76 pounds in weight at four and one-half months. This was their second year as winner of the champion flockmaster cup.

Father-and-son partnerships have long been encouraged by the Michigan State college farm management department, which pioneered in the development of the father and son partnership plans.

E. B. Hill, head of the department, points out that this type of partnership is often the ideal way for a young man to start farming. It provides capital, working equipment, livestock, and other items needed to make a good start.

County Farm Groups To Sponsor
Special Dairy Day Program

Dairy farmers of the county, acting through several farm organizations are promoting a special dairy day program to be held in Pontiac, Monday, February 16, in the 6th Floor Committee room at the Court House Building, One Lafayette Street. Sponsors of the day are: Oakland County Farm Bureau, Butter Farmers and Home Makers Club, Oakland County Soil Conservation District, Dairy Extension Planning Committee, Oakland County Extension Service and Michigan State College.

Chairman of the event is Mr. Everett Miller, Manager of Hy-Up Farms, Birmingham. The program for the day includes two speakers and two colored sound movies. Mr. Miller is arranging the program to enable farmers to have a discussion period following each topic. Dr. Glen Reid, Department of Animal Pathology, Michigan State College, will discuss herd health for dairy farmers, giving the latest information on mastitis control and vaccination for Bangs disease, using strain Vaccine M.

Professor Roy Decker of the Farm Crops Department, Michigan State college will discuss pasture improvement crop varieties and hay making. Two movies are to be shown, "Milking the Modern Way", a film showing the practices and theory of fast milking as developed by the University of Minnesota and "Weed Control with 2,4-D". In growing corn, wheat, oats, barley and pasture.

The meeting will start promptly at 10:00 a.m. on the 5th floor of the Court House Annex in Pontiac.

Soil Tests Will Tell
What Your Land Needs

Soil testing is one means by which farmers can determine in advance of planting whether lime or extra plant food in the form of stable manure and commercial fertilizer will prove profitable.

Rick Law, soil science specialist at Michigan State college, says that soil deficiencies can also be detected by testing the tissue of growing crops and even by the appearance of crops. He urges that farmers determine soil needs in advance of planting time. Waiting to diagnose soil deficiencies until the crop is partly grown, he points out, is similar to looking for a horse after the horse is stolen—it may be too late to do anything about it.

Fertile soil high in organic matter is best for beans. Any green manure should be plowed under by May 15, otherwise the yield may be cut as much as one-half and the quality of the beans lowered.

Pettigrove predicts that greater developments in the years ahead will influence the production and quality of the Michigan bean crop.

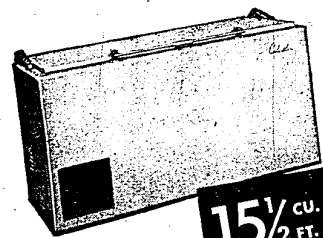

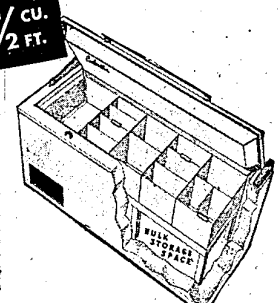
