ning's meeting, a representa-  
tive from a commercial company,  
offering a service whereby the city  
water would be treated at the  
pumping station, making it impos-  
sible for iron and other mineral de-  
posits in the water to sequester  
and thus coat water mains and  
pipes and fixtures. He offered to  
make an analysis of the situation  
in Farmington and submit a pro-  
posal to the City. Several nearby  
communities are already using the  
service.

Mr. Glenn Leland made a special  
report of the sewer and water  
departments, at the request of the  
commission, setting forth a com-  
plete survey of all water connec-  
tions within the city. He reported  
contained several recommendations

ing.

Commissioner Kenn Loomis re-  
ported on his findings in working  
out an insurance agreement on the

### "A. A." MEMBER SPEAKS BEFORE MEN'S CLUB

A most interesting and enlighten-  
ing talk was given before members  
and guests of The Men's Club at  
the Methodist Church, at their regu-  
lar meeting on Tuesday evening.

The speaker was a representa-  
tive of the "Alcoholics Anony-  
mous" group of Greater Detroit.  
For his subject matter, he drew  
on his personal experience, relat-  
ing of how he faced the loss of his  
family and his position because he  
could not leave alcohol alone.

He outlined the three steps an  
alcoholic must go through before  
he can once again hope to lead a  
normal life. First is the realiza-  
tion of the fact that the fault lies  
within the alcoholic himself, and  
not with anyone else. He alone  
is responsible for the position in  
which he finds himself, and, in  
humility, he wishes to help himself.

Secondly, he reaches the stage  
where he can control the craving  
for alcohol, if only for a short time,  
and finally, he becomes a crusader.  
There is but one obligation to al-  
coholics Anonymous, and that is  
a moral obligation to help another.

The speaker also pointed out  
that the craving for alcohol is not  
gone, even though the alcoholic may  
never touch a drop of liquor. It is  
always necessary, he stated, to  
avoid every temptation, and they  
will occur, no matter how much one  
gets out of the way to avoid them.

The Men's Club group very much  
enjoyed having this speaker with  
them, and they gained a keener  
understanding of Alcoholics An-  
onymous, and the work this organi-  
zation is doing.
