Kindergarten Change

An additional session of Kindergarten children will be added at the Fairview school to help ease the overcrowded condition in the School District, Dunkel announced. At the present time there are two sessions each at the Fairview and German schools. A total of 97 children are now enrolled in Kindergarten at the Fairview school and 51 children at the German school.

Under the new plan an extra session will be added to the Fairview school bringing their session load from a present 40 to 56 children to 20 or 30. The time of the three sessions will be 8:30 to 10:30, 10:40 to 12:40 and 12:50 to 2:50. No great change in transportation will be necessary. An additional teacher will be added at the Fairview school to assist the present teacher.

The two sessions now in operation at the German school will continue with the transfer of a few border cases to the Fairview school. The new plan will be put in operation Monday.

DAIRYMEN TO MAKE TOUR OF OAKLAND COUNTY FARMS

Dairy farmers of Southeastern Oakland County and the agricultural extension service will conduct a dairy farm tour of the County on Thursday, February 26, Karl D. Balfour, County Agricultural Agent announced this week.

Professor George Parsons of the Dairy Department of Michigan State College and Karl Balfour will conduct the tour, which will stop at four dairy farms throughout the county.

The first farm to be visited will be the William F. Pickett farm, 540 Lone Tree Road, two miles north, one half mile west of Milford. The group is scheduled to stop there at about 10 a.m. Nineteen head of purebred Guernsey cows, artificially bred, will be seen as well as a special calf barn.

At 11 o'clock the group is expected to visit the Charles Coo and Sons farm, one mile south and 3 1/2 miles southeast of New Hudson on Spaulding Road. The group will see 46 head of Holstein cows, artificially bred. During the year, a total of 20 heifer calves and six bull calves have been produced by artificial breeding.

The Trumore Farms, owned by Dr. Harold Norris and operated by Clifford Jenkins will be visited at 1:30 p.m. The farm is located 3 1/2 miles west of Mendonbrook. Thirteen head of artificially bred cattle will be observed as well as a new ten-type barn with milking parlor and dairy sales room.

At 3:00 p.m. the George Campbell farm, corner of Haggerty and Fourteen Mile Road will be visited by the group. Fourteen head of artificially bred Holstein cows will be shown.




