The best of luck to Albert Detho, who has accepted a position as organist in one of Detroit's largest churches, while continuing his studies in his Sophomore year at Wayne University.

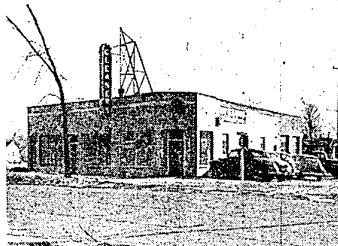

Michigan Out-Of-Doors

Tops of cedars logged from swamps long have been an important supplement of the deer herds' winter food supply. This winter, under the timber sale program being developed by the conservation department's forestry division, some cedar will become available where and when the need in the state forests is expected to be greatest.

Some 300 cutting permits on state-owned lands in deeryards are now in effect, and as many more are being prepared for auctioning to operators soon. Cutting under these permits is restricted to the months of December, January, February and March. In addition to the timber involved in formal sale, a number of small plots have been located in each district, where emergency cuttings may be made as much as five years in advance, and cutting areas so spaced that the cutting will be economical to the operator, an improvement to the timber stand, and a dependable food supply for the deer when it is most needed.

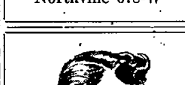
