Board Approves Location Of New School Buildings

Final Plans To Be Ready In April

A complete survey of the newly purchased school site on Middlebelt Road north of 10 Mile Road has been made and recommendations approved for the location of the proposed five-classroom school. It was announced following the regular meeting of the Board of Education of the Farmington Township School District Monday evening.

Mr. Frederick Madison, school architect, appeared before the Board with complete final surveys of the property on Middlebelt Road and also on the city site north of the present high school building. Location of the school in the Noble-William Grace area, Middlebelt Road, 19 Mile Road, was recommended on the high ground to the north side of the property.

TO DRILL WELL

Location of a well on the Noble-William Grace area property was recommended by Madison. The Board approved the location of the well and the well and directed O. E. Dunckel, superintendent of schools, to secure bids for the drilling. Representatives of the Board were delegated to appear at the meeting of the City Commission to determine what might be done regarding water and sewer on the city school site.

Plans on the location of the Noble-William Grace area school show the first five classroom unit on the high ground to the north side of the property with possible expansion to the south. The building would be 133 feet long and 26 feet wide, allowing for landscaping and possible parking space. This site was selected because of best drainage and with an eye to future development if necessary.

The proposed classroom unit on the city school site would be located 110 feet south of 10 Mile Road and west of Power almost directly north of the present high school athletic field. Plans call for a permanent 10 classroom structure to be erected on this site.

AWAIT FINAL PLANS

Madison stated that final plans and specifications would be ready in about three weeks. As soon as plans are complete they will be reviewed by the Board of Education. Following the Board's approval they will be forwarded to the State Department of Public Instruction.

Mr. Labadie showed the Commission a blueprint of the new school building that is to be erected on the new school site facing toward Ten Mile Road, and also showing the future plans of the district for buildings on the property. It was agreed that the school engineer and the city engineer should be consulted as to whether the plans to determine the best means of providing sewage and water facilities to the school site. The property is within an undeveloped section of the City.

WATER WAZED

A survey has been made of the city water supply, to determine the cost of treating the water with chemical to prevent the settling of rust and mineral content. The system is now being used in several of the city communities. The commission will make further inquiry regarding the use of the chemical, and if it seems advantageous to put the system into use here, it will be considered when the budget for the new year is drawn up.

City Clerk Harry Moore reported that a bill had just been received from the Village of Northville, in the amount of \$57.50, for services rendered by their fire department at the big fire in Farmington on January 21, 1947. No previous statement had been rendered. It was decided to take the matter up with Northville officials before any action is taken, since the two units have given aid whenever needed in the past on reciprocity basis.
