And 12 subordinate employees of the at-torney general are better puld than the attorney general! The governor of Michigan draws \$17,500 from the state treasury. This commencation is as follows:

His capstitutional salary, \$5,000;
a legislative-set salary as a member of the state administration board, \$2,500; and a flat \$10,000 expense account for which no accounting is required or given.

Among the amendments currently considered by the legislature at Lansling is one to romove constitutional salary limitations of both state officials and state legislators. The State Supreme court has ruled that the legislature is forbidden by the constitution from paying themselves expense money. This decision puts the governor's expense account in obvious legal jeopardy.
