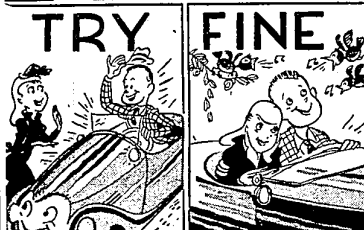
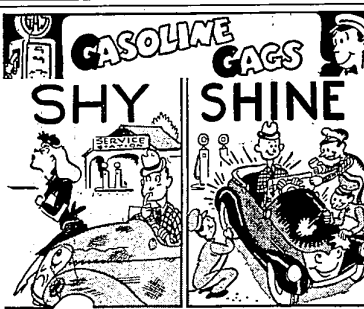
SGT. F. N. GOERS HOME ON LEAVE FROM CALIFORNIA

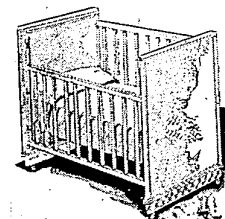
