SUMMER MUSIC PROGRAM PLANNED AT CLARENCEVILLE

Arthur Mann, director of music in the Clarenceville schools, announced this week that the Clarenceville summer music program will begin on Monday, June 21.

The annual Summer Music program at Clarenceville is open to all students, now in the fourth grade and up through high school. Mann stated that instruction is free, but that parents must furnish students with their own instruments. Suggested instruments include: cornets, trumpets, trombones, saxophones and drums.

Beginning classes will be held in baton, twirling as well as instrumental music. Mann stated that the summer band would be enlarged to include some of the younger students who have not had an opportunity as yet to play in the band.

Classes will be held daily at the Clarenceville High School and a schedule will be prepared as soon as the enrollment is known. Several concerts are being planned with other nearby schools.


