The Clarenceville Summer Recreation Program got under way with good attendance reported in all events, program director Lloyd Samuels announced this week.

COUNTY FARMER ENTERS MALTING BARLEY CONTEST

Harold D. Mitchell, who farms near Grand Blanc, has announced that he will enter the 1948 malting barley contest now being conducted by the Midwest Barley Improvement Association of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, in seven midwest states, including Michigan.

The barley contest, entries in which close July 15, is being conducted to improve the quantity and quality of this important crop, according to Dr. John H. Parker, director of the barley association.

The requirements of the malting industry will amount to at least 125,000 bushels of barley in 1948, Dr. Parker said.

To compete, farmers must grow an approved variety of malting barley and must enter a carload, or not less than part of a carload. Only barley grown in the following states is eligible to compete in the contest: North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Illinois and Michigan.

Motion carried, all yeas.

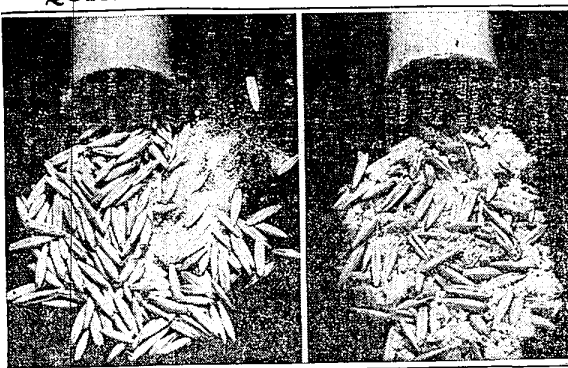

QUICK TEST TELLS IF GRAIN IS DRY



Farmers who want to avoid loss from grain heating in storage can make this simple test devised by Dr. S. T. Dexter, farm crops research scientist at the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station. A small wafer of cardboard containing an individual ice cream cup is used in the test. A sample of grain, representing the average condition of the field, is placed in the container. To this is added about a half teaspoon of ammonium chloride salt which can be obtained from the drugist. The conditioner is then closed and shaken vigorously 50 times.

Results of the test are shown in the two photographs above. At the left, the salt comes out of the tube dry and in single grains as it was when first put in. This shows that the grain is dry enough to store under ordinary farm conditions. The salt in the picture on the right is damp and clumped together, showing that the grain is too damp for storage. A little practice makes the test easy and quick. Then samples can be taken and the test performed in the field at harvest time.

Corn Cob Nylon
In the future, according to nylon authorities, corn cobs will be one of the important raw materials used in making nylon hosiery, used for wet sitting in wet corn milling. Corn cobs and other cellulose farm by-products, such as cottonseed hulls and the hulls or bran of oats and rice, are sources of a chemical known as furfural, which can be converted into adiponitrile, a chemical important in making nylon yarn and nylon plastics.
