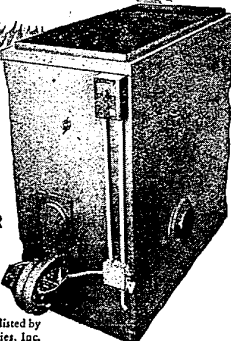

Northville Horse Show To Aid Local American Cancer Society

Get your tickets from your local American Cancer Society for the Northville Horse Show to be held at the Northville Riding Academy, 35109 West Seven Mile Road and sponsored by the Northville Rotary Club to be held on July 30th, 31st and August 1st. It is again making its bid as one of Michigan's leading horse shows. Part of the proceeds will go to the Institute of Cancer Research located locally in Detroit — a worthy purpose. Tickets will be available at the local branch of the American Cancer Society located at 15 W. Huron Street, Pontiac, Michigan, or by

phone; tickets will be mailed to you upon request. Tickets have been available since July 15. The price is \$3.00, covering the entire show. Afternoon and evening shows on July 30 and 31 and August 1 one evening show. Afternoon shows are at 1:30 and evening shows 7:30.

The show will continue throughout the three days. Classes are subdivided into 49 events: Five Gaited Saddle Horses, Five Harness Horses, Three gaited Saddle Horses, Hunters, Jumpers, Tennessee Walking Horses, Western and Palomino Horses, Morgan Horses, Saddle Bred Yearlings, Pleasure Horses and Quarter Horses. In addition there will be Junior Horseman classes 12 years old and under and also 13 to 18 years old. An imposing total of \$4,300 in prize money plus trophies and ribbons will be awarded during the three day event. The American Cancer Society receives half of the ticket money. They benefit only through those tickets sold through their office . . . not those sold at the gate.

Drilled in Fertilizer
Helps Barley Crop Get Quick Start in Spring

CHICAGO—The fertilizers farmers use on barley and other small grains will give larger increases in yield per pound of fertilizer if the plant food is put in with a fertilizer attachment on the grain drill, declared the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee in a statement issued here.

With the drill the fertilizer is applied more or less in bands, close to the seed. The plants get a quick start in the spring and are better able to compete with the soil for the plant food.

Another way to get bigger increases from the same amount of fertilizer is to use it on soil with good structure—where legumes and grasses have been used regularly in the rotation. Plant food in the soil will be used only as the roots reach out to it. And good tilth is needed for strong roots.

Large amounts of fertilizer high in nitrogen drilled with the barley and small grains may injure the seed. The amounts that can be drilled with the seed without injury vary from soil to soil, says the statement. The committee advises that farmers check with their state agronomists and county agents for recommendations on the kind, amount and method of application of fertilizer.

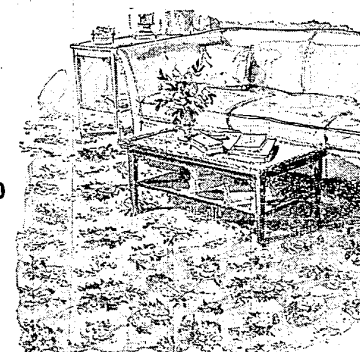

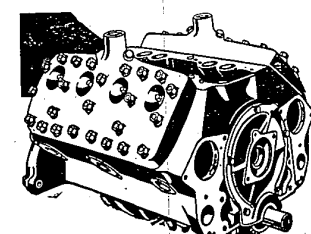
