A call for help was radioed from the boat six miles off the mouth of the Detroit River. The Navy sent out a FBY-Catalina and the woman was transferred from the excursion steamer to the plane in a small boat. It was just dusk when the plane arrived and the transfer was made in slightly choppy waters with little difficulty, the plane arriving back at the Grosvenor air base at 9:20 p.m. Mrs. Esslinger was taken to the Wzandotte Hospital where her condition was described as "good". The boat arrived back in Detroit about an hour later than planned. The excursion ended one of the most active summer band schedules in recent years, with the group giving five concerts and taking part in one parade. Over 138 students participated in the program during the six weeks course. Instruction was taken at the Bond and Noble Schools for students there, as well as at the Farmington City schools.

HOUSEWIVES HELP DESIGN PRODUCTS THEY WILL BUY

Homemakers faced with the problem of planning programs for various products to which they belong can plan one or more interesting programs very easily by participating in the "Consumer Speaks" project.

If you are interested in this worthwhile project write to Marjorie Knoll, School of Home Economics, Michigan State College, East Lansing, for the materials. She will send you the forms for reporting group opinions and also suggestions for conducting the meetings.

Topics for discussion for the fall of 1948 and the spring of 1949 include: canned fruits and vegetables; vacuum cleaners; children's snow suits; and upholstered chairs. Your group may choose one, two, three or all of the topics. The "Consumer Speaks" project is sponsored by the American Home Economics association. It gives homemakers a chance to tell manufacturers what they would like in various commercial products. Their opinions are collected, published and turned over to the manufacturers.

General procedure for conducting "Consumer Speaks" meetings is first to hold a group discussion regarding the topic and then to divide into different characteristics the group feels would be desirable or essential to that article.

This project thus gives you a chance to tell the manufacturer what you want before the product is manufactured. It also gives your club a planned program which is not only interesting but also worthwhile.

Any woman's club, church, society, extension group or study club of any sort is eligible to participate in the "Consumer Speaks" project. You should plan one meeting for each topic you wish to consider.

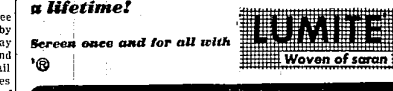
He was found guilty when arraigned, and fined \$100.00 and \$10.00 costs, or sixty days in the Oakland County jail.
