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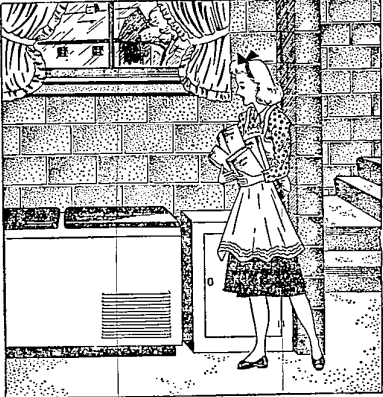

**NEED MORE ROOM IN YOUR OLD HOME?
DRY BASEMENT GIVES EXTRA SPACE**



For farm families whose basementless houses are bursting at the seams, building a watertight basement is a practical way of obtaining much needed room.

A modern, dry basement provides space for a laundry and drying room, for a convenient food storage room, or for that new cold storage box. It's a wonderful place for children, too. Part of it can be made into a recreation or game room which will save wear and tear on the living room furniture — and provides a cozy place for the groupings as well. It is a convenient place for the central heating plant. Fuel storage in the basement eliminates those unpleasant signs to an outside fuel bin.

Concrete masonry units are well adapted for basement walls. They lay up rapidly and make a neat clean wall.

How to Build a Watertight Basement

Use a good quality block with sharp, straight edges and corners. Be certain that they are entirely dry when placed in the wall. See that all joints are well filled with a rich mortar. Cover the outside of the wall below grade with two coats of portland cement plaster and then mop it with hot asphalt. The plaster coats and asphalt assure watertightness. Where ground water is a problem, take extra precautions to keep the walls dry. Place drain tile around the outside edge of the footings and connect it to a suitable outlet. Cover the tile with a 12-in. layer of gravel or crushed rock. Finish the rest of the fill with dirt from the excavation and pack it well. Slope the top of fill away from house. This helps runoff of rain-water.

You can make the floor watertight and durable by using a single course of masonry concrete made in proportions of 1 sack portland cement, 2 1/2 cu. ft. of sand, 3 cu. ft. of gravel with about 5 gal. of water. The floor is generally made about 4 in. thick. However, in poorly drained soils make the floor about 6 in. thick and place in two courses. Mop the first course, which is about 2 in. thick, with hot asphalt and cover it with a layer of waterproof roofing felt. Then place over this the second course, which is about 4 in. thick. The wall and floor can be prevented by leaving a 1-in. wide space around the edge of the floor and then filling it with hot asphalt.
