DR. H. E. VIERGUTZ ATTENDS LIONS CLUB CONVENTION

Dr. H. E. Viergutz, past president of the Farmington Lions Club, was the local group's representative at the 31st annual convention of the International Association of Lions Clubs at Madison Square Garden in New York, held the end of July.

Dr. Viergutz reported that although entertainment played a major role in the convention sessions, many fine speakers had been obtained and other talent also included on the program. This was a working convention, with panel sessions, committee meetings and sessions during much of the time of delegates and attendants.

The growing internationalism of the organization which now has clubs in 23 countries, was indicated by the resolutions passed by the convention session on July 29.

The convention recommended statehood for Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico, appealed for greater solidarity in this hemisphere, commended the United Nations for progress toward solution of the Palestine problem, urged local clubs to organize clothing collections to avert destitution in Europe during the coming winter, and took a strong stand against communism.

The latter resolution called on Lions Clubs to cooperate with churches, the press, and schools in their community "in a vigorous campaign against the further encroachment of the communistic way of life."

Eugene S. Briggs of Phillips University at Enid, Oklahoma, was elected as international president, succeeding Fred W. Smith of Ventura, California.

Morris Sayre, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, speaking before the convention, declared that price controls and rationing are no answer to high prices. Production is the only way to stop the spiral, he said.

Sayre urged the Lions to fight for elimination of unnecessary government spending and the high progressive income tax. He also urged education and sound thinking as the only means of solving the problems at the root of the level throughout the nation.
