Registration

Registrations will not be accepted at the polls on election day.

By resolution of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors this practice has been discontinued throughout the county.

Voters on November 2 will elect a president and vice-president of the United States; governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, attorney general, state treasurer, auditor general for the state; United States senator and representative in Congress; state senator and representative in the state legislature; and county officials including judge of probate, prosecuting attorney, sheriff, county clerk, county treasurer, register of deeds, circuit court commissioners, drain commissioners, two coroners and surveyor.

In addition, six propositions are to be voted on. First, a proposed amendment to the Constitution relative to the order of succession in the performance and duties of the governor; a proposed amendment to the Constitution providing for the repeal of Section 23, Article 10, proposed amendment to the Constitution relative to compensation of certain state officers; proposed amendment to the Constitution relative to compensation and expenses of members of the legislature; proposed amendment to Section 21 of Article X of the State Constitution, so as to modify the fifteen-minute limitation, and referendum of Act No. 270 of the Public Acts of 1947, entitled "An act to regulate and control the operation of foreign agencies acting within the State of Michigan, and to prescribe penalties for violations of the provisions of this Act."



