At the point, the game developed into a seesaw with neither team appearing to have any advantage over the other.

Statistics show that Farmington outplayed their opponents, since they managed to rack up 12 first downs to Walled Lake's 6, and gained a total of 300 yards to their opponent's 130 via the air and rushing.

The win keeps the Falcons in league play for the title, which will be played off Friday afternoon at 3:30, on the Farmington home field, when they meet undefeated Keego Harbor.

In their contest with Walled Lake, Keego Harbor rolled up the impressive score of 49 to 0.
