Clarenceville PTA Speaker Tells Of Tuberculosis War

The Clarenceville PTA held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, October 19, at 8 p.m. Principal speaker of the evening was Norbert Reinsteint, M. P. H., who spoke on the subject of tuberculosis and the importance of regular checkups. All those present were urged to take advantage of the free x-rays given through the use of the Mobile X-Ray Unit. Mr. Reinsteint told the audience that if everyone had an x-ray once a year, the dread scourge of tuberculosis could soon be wiped out.

A part of the evening's program was spent in viewing a movie shown on the various phases of tuberculosis, while the school nurses from Wayne and Oakland counties gave short but illuminating talks.

Following the speakers, the sixth graders entertained with imitations and a square dance.

A short business meeting, followed by refreshments, ended the meeting.

30-Mile Trail Ride Set By Saddle Club

A 30-mile trail ride for horsemen, on November 7, has been announced by Mrs. Paul Glasscock, secretary of the Huron Valley Saddle Club, sponsors of the event.

The trail ride is open to riding enthusiasts or saddle club members, as well as individual riders, from Ohio and Michigan is eligible to participate.
