PROPOSITION No. 1 PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION RELATIVE TO THE ORDER OF SUCCESSION IN THE PERFORMANCE AND DUTIES OF THE GOVERNOR.

A Joint Resolution of the 1947 Legislature proposing an amendment to sections 16, 17 and 18 of article 6 of the State Constitution relative to the order of succession in the performance of the powers and duties of the governor, by providing for devolution of such powers and duties upon the lieutenant governor, secretary of state, attorney general, state treasurer, and auditor general, respectively; and to provide for such devolution in the event of the death of a governor elect.

PROPOSITION No. 2 PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF SECTION 23, ARTICLE 10.

A Joint Resolution of the 1947 Legislature proposing an amendment to the State Constitution providing for the repeal and striking therefrom of Section 23 of Article 10 of the State Constitution relative to the return of one cent of a state sales tax levy to be divided among school districts, cities, townships and villages and providing for the making of annual grants to school districts out of general funds.

PROPOSITION No. 3 PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION RELATIVE TO COMPENSATION OF CERTAIN STATE OFFICERS.

A Joint Resolution of the 1948 Extra Session of the Legislature proposing an amendment to Section 21 of Article 6 of the State Constitution, providing that a compensation of the governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, auditor general, and attorney general be determined by law.

PROPOSITION No. 4 PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION RELATIVE TO COMPENSATION AND EXPENSES OF MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE.

A Joint Resolution of the 1948 Extra Session of the Legislature, proposing an amendment to Section 9 of Article 5 of the State Constitution, providing for the determination of the compensation and expenses of members of the legislature by law.

PROPOSITION No. 5 PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SECTION 21 OF ARTICLE X OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN, SO AS TO MODIFY THE FIFTEEN - MILL LIMITATION.

Inflammatory petitions proposing an amendment to Section 21 of Article X of the Constitution of the State of Michigan so as to modify the fifteen-mill limitation to permit increase of the limitation for a period of not to exceed twenty years, instead of five years, and to require a majority vote of the electors instead of a two-thirds vote to increase such limitation.

PROPOSITION No. 6 REFERENDUM OF ACT NO. 270 OF THE PUBLIC ACTS OF 1947, ENTITLED "AN ACT TO REGULATE AND CONTROL THE OPERATION OF FOREIGN AGENCIES ACTING WITHIN THE STATE OF MICHIGAN; AND TO PRESCRIBE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ACT".

Referendum for Act No. 270, of the Public Acts of 1947, entitled "An act to regulate and control the operation of foreign agencies acting within the state of Michigan and to prescribe penalties for violations of the provisions of this act."

GENERAL REVISION OF THE CONSTITUTION Shall a Convention for the purpose of a general revision of the Constitution be held?

(Continued from Page Two) when French aggression made "freedom of the seas" a menacing international issue. Work began on the site in 1930. Here the "Waag" and the "Hornet" were built to play their roles in the War of 1812, here the "Constitution" and the "President" came for overhauling and repairs.

We stop at the sentry box: "Guests of Admiral Davis". The marine sentry salutes. We know our way to the officers' club. Hand shakes and refreshments and into a bus that takes us to the event of the evening which the rain prevented us from witnessing aboard the hulking LST moored to the dock in the Anacostia river.

So we must go indoors to see one of the most thrilling things I ever saw on the screen. A motion picture made from the actual photographic record of the 1946-47 exploration of the Antarctic under Adm. Richard E. Byrd. I hope you saw or will see "Secret Land," it had its premier on Navy Day in '47.

Admiral Byrd didn't look much older than when we bid him Godspeed before he started on his first Antarctic venture. That was close to me for I was connected with the organization that syndicated the story for the press. But it was struck with the passage of time and the years of study and research that have intervened, when I looked at Dr. Paul Siple, polar authority and geographer. (He was present in the flesh as well as on the screen.)

Paul Siple was chosen to go on the 1929 expedition after winning in a competition involving 6000 Boy Scouts of America. Then he was a tall, slender lad of 20. Now he's stocky and graying. As a prominent geographer he has done important research for the war department.

The story of the Antarctic is studied with great names - Scott, Amundsen, Shackleton, to mention only three - as well as with scientific and literary. This picture of the "Secret Land," less secret now, shows the tremendous advances in technology made since the days of the early explorers.

It took thousands of years to shape the planet's winds into the refinements which make his survival in a polar land possible. In a few years in the laboratories and factories of America we have shaped the means which make survival and exploration possible in the same environment - exploratory and discovery which some day may be of tremendous benefit to mankind.

The Russians last month kept scheduling Red air maneuvers over Berlin airlift corridors. Perhaps because of the overcrowded condition of the heavens over Moscow. Minsk, Pinsk, Baku, Tartu and Stalingrad?

Local Cancer

Group Seeks Workers, Materials

The desperate need of dressings of all kinds, for the American Cancer Society, has brought a plea for volunteer sewers from Mrs. F. W. Bagnall, chairman of the society's sewing group.

According to Mrs. Bagnall, the need is acute, and the group is seeking materials as well as workers to fashion the needed dressings.

In the campaign to meet the requirements of the Society, the Methodist Church has donated the use of a room in which the volunteer workers can gather to sew one day each week. The church offered the use of a room on each Wednesday.

"While this alleviates one of the requirements of the Society, the Bagnalls, "there are other necessities which must be met also. At the present time our group needs all types of white and soft materials, from which dressings and pads can be made. Also usable will be the material from men's pastel shirts, which can be made into bed linens for patients."

Mrs. Bagnall outlined the work-plan for the volunteer sewer meeting in the church room. Anyone who can devote this one day a week to assist in meeting the requirements of the society, she said, will be expected to bring their own sandwiches for lunch. However, coffee or tea will be furnished the workers.

Mrs. Bagnall stated that volunteers who can assist only on a limited time basis will also be welcome.
