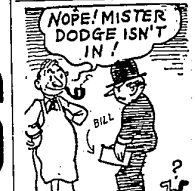
When found, the car had been pushed into the water. The river adjoining the Farmington High School football field, and the headlights, distributor, battery and radio had been stripped from it.

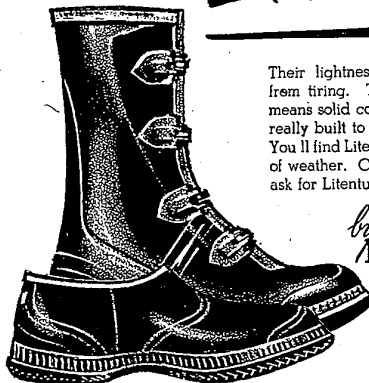
