Fall isn't the best season to plant walnuts. According to Michigan State college foresters, squirrels often dig up the nuts planted in the fall. Spring is a better time.

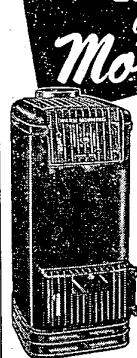
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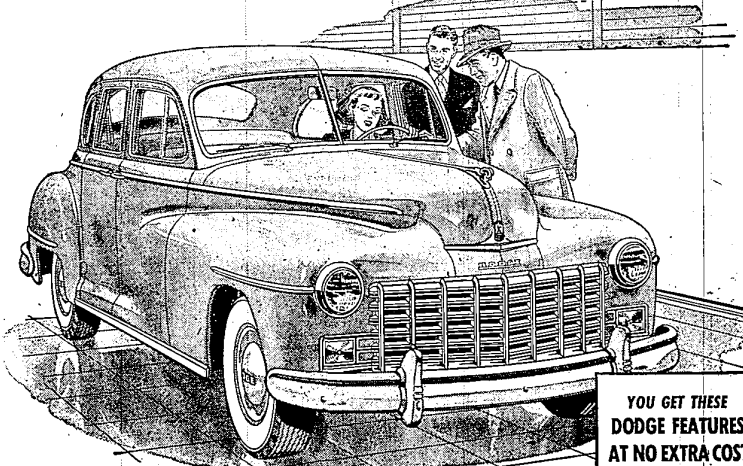
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
