Oakland Farm Groups Meet For Nominations

Oakland County farmers are reminded by Walter R. Cook, chairman of the Oakland County AAA Committee, that the annual township nominating meetings for the purpose of selecting candidates for the offices of community AAA committees was held throughout the county. The AAA convention will be held in late December for the purpose of electing the county AAA Committee for the year 1949.

The Farmington meeting was held at the home of C. E. Copeman, 3700 Nine Mile Road, November 9, at 8 p.m., Cook said.

The committee elected for 1949 will have the local responsibility for carrying out the support price program of loans and purchase agreements; the agricultural conservation program; and other national farm programs.

Mr. Cook said that this responsibility will be greater next year in view of the expected increase in price support activity and the increase in funds available for incentive payments for soil conservation practices carried out.

The names of the candidates selected at the township nominating meetings will be placed on official ballots and a copy will be mailed to each eligible farmer in the township. Those eligible farmers, by mail or in person, should fill them out and forward them to the county AAA office where they will be counted by an impartial election board.

(Continued from Page One) all wars. We refer back again to Mr. Cook.

"There was a huge bonfire, I remember," he said. "It was held over somewhere by the old gristmill, and it was a dilly. Some of the merrymakers in their exuberance were a little careless of what they did. A couple of buildings disappeared in those flames."

While the events of thirty years ago may not be recalled too plainly by many of the people who were present in Farmington at that time, the occasion will never be forgotten by the men who were overseas. They, like their friends back home, were happy too, but unlike them they did not engage in merrymaking merriment. They were happy because the noise through which they had gone for more than two years was ceasing.

Noted Lecturer Talks On India At High School

Farmington High School's Student Council recently presented as the main speaker for their assembly the well known lecturer and author, John Williams Hughes, who spoke to the students on the subject of "India in Transition."

Hughes, a former captain in the British Army, served in India as a lecturer to British and Indian forces on current affairs. This work took him to all parts of the country, giving him a good background on which to base his address. Before his service, he was a news-caster for the BBC.

His talk before the student body of Farmington High School, described one of the most important phases of present international affairs, in which a Free India is now in the process of being evolved.

After the speaker's appearance at Farmington, he went to Clarenceville High School where he again presented the address to the students of that school.

During World War II, Mr. Martin saw service as a radio gunner, with a B-24 heavy bomb group. He was shot down over Italy, and was sufficiently banged up to be grounded. He was then chief control operator at an Army Air Force base, south of Rome. Later he and two other radio men organized V.O.C.T., called "Voice of the Cotton Belt." Putting together radio parts from several wrecked B-24s, they manufactured some radios and began broadcasting in Italy, playing records for Red Cross recreation and entertainment programs for about a year during the war. Mr. Martin returned to the States in 1945 and continued with Station WABC in Flint as an announcer for over a year before joining WCAR in Pontiac.

Local talent is not to be overlooked on the program, either. An amateur show will feature individuals and groups and judging from the inquiry about this portion of the program, there will be some interesting and unusual entries.

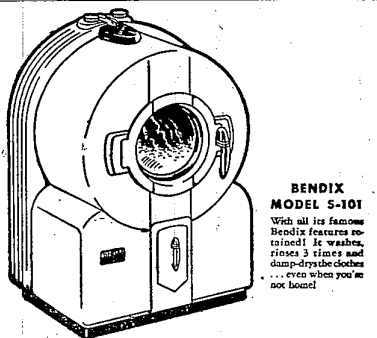
Mr. and Mrs. Earl Hemming of Beatrice Street spent the week end in Carleton, Ohio, where they were called by the illness of his mother.

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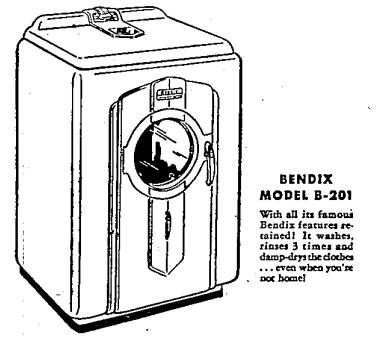
