## Electronic Wonders Shown And Explained To Farmington Students

On Wednesday November 3, the students of Farmington High School were introduced to "Modern Miracles," a program designed by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company featuring the operation of electronics and use of sound waves which play an important part in everyday modern living.

Principal Gerald Harrison introduced Hugh McPherson, of the Michigan Bell, who took charge of the program. He introduced the show of modern wonders by talking over a microphone so small and light it could be fastened to his tie, yet so sensitive it would broadcast the rubbing of his whiskers against it. He also explained how a telephone in a car was possible, and explained to the students some of the fundamentals of radar. An especially interesting demonstration included students Dick Lyons, Homer Majors and Bernard Thompson, who were invited to the

stage, where, by holding hands, they completed an electrical circuit which permitted the audience to hear recorded music through the loud speaker. When they dropped hands, the circuit was broken and the music stopped. It was then shown that sound waves could be carried through other parts of the body, such as the ear. When one of the boys touched another's ear, music again could be heard.

Tom Sechler, another student, was called upon to assist in an experiment which showed how the voice is amplified by use of booster units in talking over long distance. It was demonstrated that if it were not for these booster units, this talking over long distance would not be possible.

## WHEN STORING YOUR DEER

The successful deer hunter, returning with his kill, as the bow-and-arrow hunter has been doing, will be thinking of locker plants in which to store his game. Miles A. Nelson, Chief of the Bureau of Marketing and Enforcement, Michigan Department of Agriculture, advises that under the provisions of the State Locker Plant Regulations, "The storage of hides and skins . . . is prohibited . . . unless separate storage rooms with no open passages leading into the locker room, chill room, aging room or sharp freeze room are provided for this purpose."

Briefly, deer with hides or skins on, constitute "Hides" or "Skins" as referred to in the Regulation, and must be stored in a separate room from other meat or food products at food locker plants.

Let's hope you never see smoke coming from your silo caused by spontaneous combustion. But if it should happen, take a tip from the Kansas farmer who conferred hastily with extension agents and then called a chemical company to bring a number of cakes of dry ice. The ice was dropped in from the top of the silo and the fire went out. The dry ice or carbon dioxide method has also been used to fight fires in hay mows.
