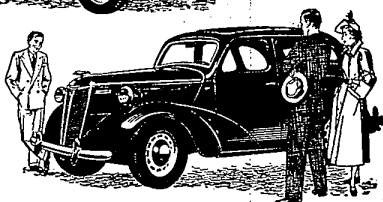
## STUDENT RETURNS

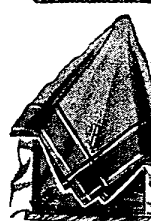

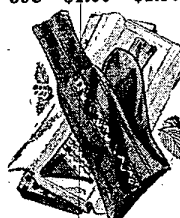
