FARMERS GIVEN HINTS ON BETTER SOIL CONSERVATION

In keeping with the New Year's tradition for making resolutions, County Agricultural Agent Karl D. Taiter this week furnished a list of resolutions to help improve the farm business.

His suggestions for the new year are planned to help in conservation and to make farming more profitable.

1. Establish a cropping program suited to the farm's soils.
2. Make more adequate use of legumes.
3. Apply liming materials to acid fields.

4. Plan lime applications at least a year before legume seeding.
5. Apply adequate applications of phosphate and potash with all legume seedlings.
6. Use more alfalfa-brome grass meadow for pasture.
7. Establish sod in all watercourses to prevent gullying.
8. Keep a living, growing crop on the land at all times.
9. Work across the slope where ever possible.
10. Plow down a legume sod when an open cultivated crop is to be grown.

Production of cotton in North Carolina during 1947 totaled 432,000 bales of 500-pound gross weight. This is 12,000 bales more than was produced from the 1944 crop.

MSC STARTS STUDY OF RURAL ATTITUDES TOWARD MINORITIES

A study of the attitudes of rural Michigan people toward minority groups will get under way soon by the Department of Sociology and Anthropology of Michigan State College.

The research project will be financed by a grant of \$10,500 from the American Jewish League and the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith of New York City.

Dr. Wilbur B. Brookover, assistant professor of sociology, has been named chairman of a college group to set up the survey. General purpose of the work will be to study the operation and psychology of the rural society, with an eye toward protection of all minority groups. The study will not confine attention to any special religious, racial or nationality group.

New Dormitory Started At MSC

The end of the year at Michigan State College saw the beginning of work on the sixth men's dormitory to house 1,000 students.

The \$4,340,000 construction, to be financed by self-liquidating bonds and without public expense, is being constructed on the south bank of the Red Cedar River near the former site of WKAR's transmitter house and antenna.

Completion of the new dormitory will increase the capacity of college-owned housing for single men students from 1,950 to 3,020, according to Karl H. McDonel, secretary of the State Board of Agriculture.

The dormitory will bring the total of buildings constructed since the end of World War I on a self-liquidating basis to \$17,540,000. A building program of \$12,500,000 supplied by the Michigan State legislature is also nearing completion on the MSC campus.

Enrollment At MSC Is Twelfth In Nation

Michigan State College, with a full-time enrollment of 15,092 students, now ranks as the twelfth largest in the nation, according to Dr. Raymond Wickersham, president of the University of Cincinnati.

The University of Michigan, with 21,004 full-time students, ranks in eighth place. In terms of total enrollment, which includes part-time students, Michigan is ninth with 23,044; Wayne University 16th with 17,925; and Michigan State 20th, with 15,092.

Cleanliness In Eggs Means Higher Quality

Cleanliness is one of the first needs for quality eggs. That means eggs that are produced clean and not cleaned by hand, says Howard Zingel, Michigan State College extension poultry specialist.

Hand cleaning is liable to be injurious to the egg's quality. The protective coating of the shell is removed and the egg deteriorates faster, the poultryman revealed.

The specialist says farmers can have clean eggs by giving the hens clean nests, dry litter, keeping hens in utility yards are dry, and by frequent collection. Hens that wander around a dirty barnyard and then track in the laying house are the worst offenders.

Farmers will save work and make money by producing clean eggs.

PLAN POULTRY PROGRAM FOR FARMERS' WEEK

To bring Michigan poultry raisers the newest information on chickens and turkeys, a comprehensive program has been planned for Michigan State College's Farmers' Week, January 24 through 28.

The three day session will begin on Tuesday morning with sessions on poultry management. A description of the national Chicken of Tomorrow contest will be presented by H. L. Shaver of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The afternoon will feature quality egg hints and stress grading, consumer preferences, and wholesale market needs.

Poultry improvement day is set for Wednesday, January 26. Talks on breeding, disease control, and hatchery management will be included. E. M. Pank, poultryman at Missouri State College, will be a guest speaker and tell of experience in that state in increasing poultry profits.

For turkey raisers, Thursday's program will offer a number of interesting meetings. A resume of the turkey festival at Alma will be presented and feeding, disease control, marketing will be discussed. A visiting speaker will be D. D. Moyer, Ohio State College poultryman, who will talk on management and marketing in his home state.

Another poultry feature of the week will be a baby chick and egg show in the MSC poultry building. Entries will consist of 25 chicks of any standard breed or variety. White or brown eggs in a number of classes will be entered in the egg show. Farmers, hatcheries, breeders, fanners, FFA and 4-H Clubs, and members of the MSC poultry science club are being urged to enter the egg contest.

NEW MARKETING COURSE IS OPENED AT STATE COLLEGE

To bring students into direct contact with successful operators and leaders in the field of marketing, a new course has been set up for the winter term now operating at Michigan State College at East Lansing.

The new course is offered jointly by the departments of horticulture and economics to enable students to study special problems in handling and marketing of fruits and vegetables. Leaders of the industry have agreed to be visiting lecturers and consultants to the students.

Among those who have agreed to serve are Dr. Harry J. Eustice, vice-president, Farm Market Relations, Inc., San Francisco, Calif.; Dr. Irving Woodson, general manager, California Fruit Exchange, Sacramento, California; and Porter Taylor, director, Fruit and Vegetable Department of the American Farm Bureau Federation, Washington, D.C.

These men, and others, will address classes on Monday and Tuesday of each week. On Tuesday evenings, the guest speaker will address an open meeting to which the public will be invited.

Students will also select a special problem in the field of handling and marketing and will have an opportunity to discuss his problem with the visiting speaker each week in private consultation.
