Home Sounds WSU Faculty Hazardous To Exhibit Art

Workers who protect themselves from excessive on-the-job noise levels through the use of ear plugs or protective earmuffs, frequently do not realize they can encounter equally hazardous sound levels within their own homes, warn hearing experts.

They point out that kitchen appliances can generate as much sound as a milling machine and that a power lawn mower can match the noise output of a printing press.
