Supreme Court Decision
Upholds Milk Standard

The Michigan Supreme Court, in a decision handed down on January 5, has upheld the state law requiring 2 per cent butterfat in all chocolate drinks made of milk and skim milk. The provision was passed by the 1947 Legislature, but enforcement prior to the decision was blocked by a restraining order obtained in the Midland County Circuit Court.

The court held that the act does not prohibit the sale of "chocolate milk" or "chocolate drink" but sets a standard of 2 per cent butterfat which is the same as the standard set for milk.

ANTLER CONTEST
PLANNED AT MSC
FOR RURAL HUNTERS

If you live or work on a farm and want to prove that deer you killed had the best antlers in Michigan, you have a chance to prove it. As a part of the Farmers' Week Conservation show, there will be a contest where deer antlers will be exhibited.

Any deer hunter who lives or works on a farm may enter by sending or bringing the mounted or unmounted antlers to the Conservation show in the Women's Gymnasium at Michigan State College, East Lansing, on Wednesday noon, January 26.

Prize ribbons will be awarded for the most symmetrical set of antlers, the set of antlers with the largest number of points and the most unusual or freakish set of antlers.

The Conservation Show, being revived this year after being suspended since the war, is expected to prove popular with sportsmen and city people in addition to farmers. Many new features have been added, including exhibitions of synchronized ballet swimming by Michigan State College women students. Exhibitions of canoe handling, fly and bait casting, handling of guns and bows and arrows and a bench show of hunting dogs are included in the features.

Farmington Youths
Serving In Japan

Private First Class Lewis E. Howard, a Farmington youth, is currently serving with the occupation forces in Northern Honshu, Japan, as a member of the 11th Airborne Division. He is presently serving as a clerk for Company "B" of the 127th Airborne Engineer Battalion, stationed near Sendai, Japan. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Howard of 26935 Halsted Road.

Pfc. Howard entered the Army in April, 1947, at Detroit, and was sent to Fort Lewis, Washington, where he completed a course in Basic Infantry Training in July, 1947. Soon after arrival overseas, he volunteered for duty with the 11th Airborne Division and was later assigned to his present unit, the 127th Airborne Engineer Battalion, stationed near Sendai, Japan. He qualified as a paratrooper in December, 1947 at the 11th Airborne Division Training Center, Matsushima Army Airborne, Yamato, Northern Honshu, Japan.

Pfc. Howard was a student at Farmington High School before entering the Army. He plans to continue his education upon discharge from the Army.

Recruit Harold S. Harrington, son of Mrs. Helen Erwin of 19680 Brentwood, Farmington, is now serving with Company "A", 18th Glider Infantry Regiment of the 11th Airborne Division located near Sapporo, Hokkaido, Japan.

He entered the Army on the 25th of June, 1948, at Farmington and received his infantry basic training at Fort Knox, Kentucky. In October 1948 he was ordered overseas to become a member of the Occupation Forces in the Far East Command.

Tick Tock Shop Robbed
Of Clocks And Potts

For the second time in less than three weeks the Tick Tock Shop, at 3038 Grand River, was the scene of a breaking and entering.

On December 29, thieves cut a hole in a window, and after unlocking the window frame, entered the establishment and took loot valued at \$50, consisting of clocks, alarm clocks and wristwatch bands. It was reported to police.

On January 6, entrance was made in the same manner, but the loot was much greater. On the second visit the thieves or thieves made off with four mantle clocks valued at \$50 each, and four boxes of watch repairing parts valued at \$1,000. N. A. Celinske, the owner, reported.

Farmington police, in their investigation, found the glass of the window broken, and the telephone, off the receiver, hanging off. Police are checking on clues left behind.

LISTS JOBS OPEN
TO VETS, NON-VETS

Job openings, and acceptance of applications for the positions of janitor, elevator operator, hospital attendants, kitchen helpers, laborers, laundry helpers and general mechanics and helpers, for employment at the Veterans Hospital at Darbarn, has been announced by the United States Civil Service Commission.

Some of the positions listed are open to both men and women, but in all cases, veterans will be given preference, although if insufficient applicants with the preference rating apply, the positions will be filled with non-veterans. Salaries of the above positions range from \$2,020 to \$2,799 a year.

College students majoring in the field of veterinary medicine, physical science, soil conservation and engineering are invited to file applications for vacation employment in various Federal agencies in trainee positions as veterinarians, chemical engineers, meteorologists and soil conservationists. The starting salaries for these positions are from \$2,495 to \$2,974 a year.

The vacancies to be filled are in Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin. Applications will be accepted from sophomores and juniors in institutions above high school level who expect to complete the first two or three years' work in their respective fields by June 30, 1949.

STATE CONFERENCE
OF PASTORS TO OPEN
MONDAY AT U. OF M.

Leaders of Michigan churches will meet at the University of Michigan on January 17 to 19 for the tenth annual Michigan Pastor's Conference.

The three-day program is sponsored by the Michigan Council of Churches and Religious Education and by the University Extension Service. All sessions will be open to interested laymen as well as to ministers of all faiths.

Principal speakers will be Dr. Ansley Moore, of Pittsburgh; Dr.

Robert Worth Frank, president-elect of McCormick Theological Seminary, Chicago; and Dr. John Coleman Bennett, professor of Christian theology and ethics, Union Theological Seminary, New York City.

In addition to sermons and lectures by these three speakers, group discussion meetings will be held on such topics as pastoral calling, church music, church administration, and audio-visual aids.

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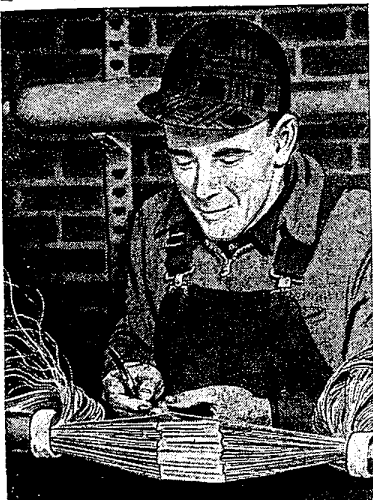
