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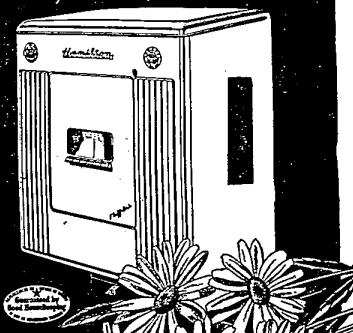

The boys in the shop classes are working hard after their vacation. Mr. Isaac Snell, instructor, is proud of the way they are progressing.



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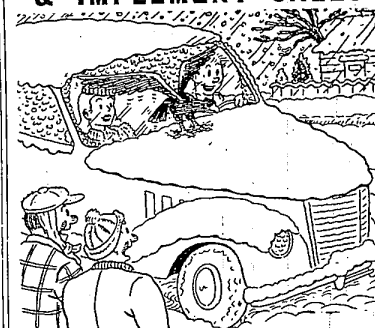
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
