Research Proves Production Aid

Research is the helping hand to production and marketing of fruits and vegetables, according to Dr. H. B. Tukey, head of the department of horticulture at Michigan State College.

"Production and research work hand-in-hand to overcome the problems of the industry," the horticulturist said in pointing to the value of the new research laboratories for horticulture at the college.

Extension specialists, meeting with growers, find new problems in production and marketing. They bring these problems to research personnel, and, according to Dr. Tukey, they set out to find the answers. At the same time research results are carried to producers for field tests.

"The two-way flow of questions and answers between the farms and the laboratories is the only way we can provide more and better products for the consumer," the fruit and vegetable authority contends.

OAKLAND COUNTY MAN SEEKS STATE HIGHWAY POST

William H. Harvie, Oakland County resident near Birmingham, has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination as State Highway Commissioner for the spring election.

Harvie, a former engineer with the State Highway department, was in charge of highway design and construction under Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner. Previously, he had been with the Wayne County Road Commission for ten years.

For the last three years Harvie has maintained his own firm as a highway contractor. During World War II he served as a Major and as Lt. Colonel with the Corps of Army Engineers, supervising military airport construction in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana. He was also responsible for the construction completion of the Allan Highway, following which he was made commanding officer in charge of maintenance of the highway.

Harvie was born on a farm in Lapeer County in 1899. He attended rural schools and Imity City High School, Ferris Institute and Michigan State College. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1922 with a degree in civil engineering. He later attended the Detroit College of Law and was admitted to the bar in 1930.

A registered civil engineer, Harvie is a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, Detroit Engineering Society, Michigan Engineering Society, Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion.

County Poultry Grower Competes At Boston Show

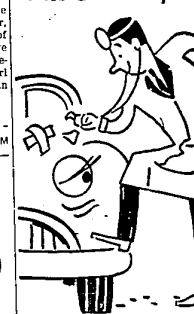
Entries of an Oakland County poultryman will compete for championship honors with more than 5,000 birds in the 101st annual Boston Poultry show to be held at Mechanics Building, January 19 to 23, Paul Ives, show chairman, announced this week.

More than \$5,000 in prizes will be awarded the top-ranking birds during the five-day run of the nation's oldest and largest poultry exhibitions, Ives said. Champion birds will be exhibited in a special Hall of Fame.

Besides competition for the common varieties of domestic birds, all kinds of ornamental fowl and game birds will vie for prize awards. Other attractions of the Boston show include the 7th annual \$1,000 National Cockerel Classic, a 4-H Club poultry contest, a baby chick show, and special turkey, pheasant and pigeon exhibits.

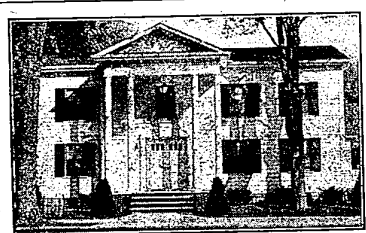
