AAA ASSIGNING ACREAGE GOALS TO POTATO GROWERS

Preliminary work is now underway in Oakland County in connection with establishing 1949 potato acreage goals for each individual farmer, according to Walter R. Cook, chairman of the Oakland County AAA Committee. The chairman said that letters are now going out from his office to all commercial potato growers in the county who are listed on his records as having grown three or more acres of potatoes in any of the past four years. The letters ask the growers to indicate by January 25, 1949, the actual planted acreage of potatoes for 1945, 1946, 1947 and 1948, and to indicate the intended planted acreage for 1949. This information will assist the County AAA Committee in determining acreage goals for each individual farmer.

Cook said that any farmer who intends to grow three or more acres of potatoes in 1949 and who does not receive a letter from the County AAA Office should notify the County AAA Office immediately by mail or a personal call, of the potato acreage he intends to plant in 1949, so that he may have an official goal assigned to his farm. This is important, Cook said, because a farmer must have been assigned a potato acreage goal and the owner must have planted within that goal, in order to be eligible for price support protection on his 1949 crop. The price in 1949 will be supported at a level equal to 60 per cent of parity. Unless the grower meets the eligibility requirements, he cannot receive a loan from the government on his potatoes, nor can he sell to the government at the support level. The chairman emphasized that this information should be supplied on or before January 25, 1949, by all growers who intend to plant three or more acres of potatoes in 1949.

Fog and poor driving conditions are believed to have contributed to the collision.

Lamb Crop Aided By Ewe Feeding

Graydon Blank, sheep authority at Michigan State College, says the spring lamb crop will be greatly influenced by what the ewes eat the next few months. Ewes can be wintered on a pound or more of good legume hay and considerable cheap roughage. But during the last half of pregnancy, the ewe should be fed enough to keep gaining weight. One month before lambing, Blank recommends feeding one-half pound of oats each day. Indole in the ration is necessary to produce strong lambs and in the northern part of Michigan cobalt is recommended. Both can be added to the salt. Ewes need exercise, which can be arranged by forcing them to walk some distance for feed.
