

TUITIONS DUE SOON

All non-resident students attending Farmington Schools are reminded that their tuition falls due at the beginning of the new semester, January 31.

The tuition fee is the difference between the per capita cost (the amount needed to educate a student in school for one year) and the amount allowed by the state. In Farmington schools this fee is \$75. Because of crowded conditions, however, it is the policy of the school not to accept non-resident pupils through the sixth grade. In high school only special cases and those who have previously been enrolled in the school are admitted.

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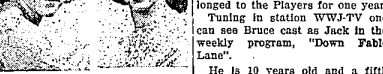
