

COOK RE-ELECTED AS AAA CHAIRMAN BY COUNTY FARMERS

The Oakland County AAA Committee to serve local farmers in administration of the various government farm programs during 1949 was elected on Friday, December 31, by a convention of 16 delegates from all rural townships in the county who assembled in Pontiac for the annual county AAA Convention.

Members elected to the county committee for 1949 were Walter R. Cook, chairman; Earl C. Taylor, vice chairman; Cyril Oliver, member; Harold Doebler, 1st alternate; and Stanley Allen, 2nd alternate. The first official act of the committee was to appoint Meriel L. Andrews of Pontiac, to serve as secretary-treasurer in the county AAA Office for the coming year. Cook has served as chairman since 1940 and Taylor has acted as vice chairman during that period. Oliver is starting his third year as member of the county committee.

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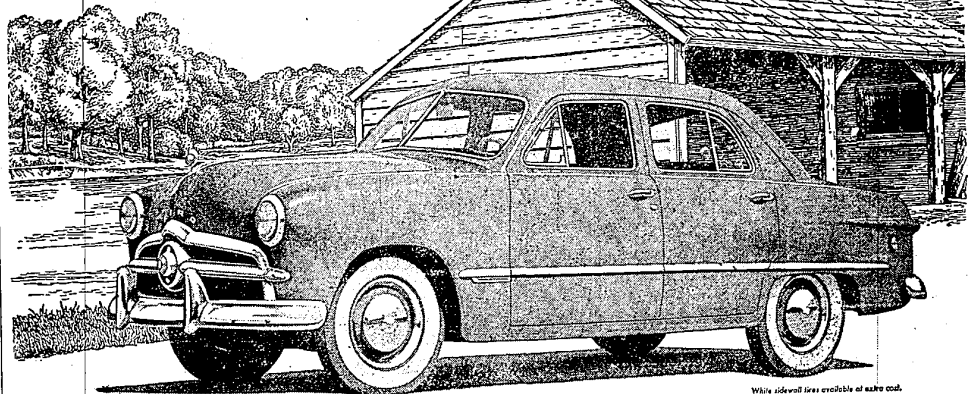
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
