ally chosen for the recipient. The program, starting at 8 p.m., was opened with the pledge of allegiance, in which the audience participated. The boys' choir, consisting of 12 voices, sang "Stout-Hearted Men," and the invocation was given by the Rev. G. Paul Musselman, of Marquette's Church.

A few words of welcome were given by Charles E. Henry, executive director of Boys Republic, and the main address was given by Rabbi Benedict Glaser, of Temple Beth El of Detroit. In his address, Rabbi Glaser paid tribute to the late Fred Butzel, and pointed out that, in his unrelenting service to many causes, of which his work with the Boys Republic was an outstanding example, Mr. Butzel had achieved the stature of a national figure in the field of charity and philanthropy. Rabbi Glaser drew a striking parallel on the life and works of Mr. Butzel with other outstanding men the world has known who gave of themselves and their talents to better their times.

The presentation of the award to Harold Robinson was made by E. Parish Lovejoy, president of the board of directors for the Boys Republic, and a few words in thanks were given by young Robinson. Robert Cruz, of the Republic, addressed the group on the value of citizenship, and its value to the individual as well as the community.

The citizen body of the school, as well as the audience, then sang "America" and the program ended with a benediction by the Rev. John Whitstock, chaplain of juvenile court.

Attending the event were Justice Henry Butzel of the Michigan State Supreme Court brother of the late Fred Butzel, and other dignitaries interested in the work carried out at the school.

Expectin' somebody to drop in? Need somethin' fer sandwiches? We got just what the Dr. ordered if he ain't gotcha on a diet. There's some braunschweiger (aint that a big word fer jest smoked liver sausage?) But the price ain't big. It's 39c a lb. Now on the other hand if the Dr. has gotcha on a diet and you gotta drink vegetables juices we got some small V-8 juice that you can have 2 cans of fer a quarter. How we doin'?

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
