The More We Practice . . .

That strength starts right here, starts right with you and your neighbors. If we forget to practice democracy right here, we can hardly expect to hold up our end. Making America strong and keeping it that way is a job of team work and every member of that team must do his part.

You are letting down the team when you fail to register and vote in local elections. Because it is here that democracy starts. It is here that government is closest to the people. When we fail to show interest in local government, democracy drops back.

Registration books are now open for the Farmington Township General Primary Election to be held February 21. They are open so that qualified electors in the Township may practice democracy. You can't vote unless you are registered and you can't carry out the responsibility that is yours as an American unless you vote.

and when it belongs to the people it should even shout a little, a revision of our State Constitution is an important "must".

This is particularly true where our financial organization is concerned. The demands of the people are becoming greater each day, both on a local and state level. It thus becomes a problem of either cutting down expenses or increasing income. In spite of many peoples' thinking, the State can't go into debt continually and remain sound financially or otherwise.

A complete revision of the State Constitution is

A complete revision of the State Constitution is unnecessary. In fact, it would be wasteful. Many of the basic principles of the government are as sound as they were a hundred or even three hundred years ago. But financial operations of government and obligations of government have changed considerably. It would seem logical to adopt a plan for the State of Michigan similar to that adopted by the Federal Government. A study committee could be appointed by the governor to analyze the financial structure of the state and make recommendations for economical reorganization.

It is possible that under such a plan both economy and added efficiency could be established. The cost of such a program would cost less and accomplish more than the putting of a Constitutional Convention into operation. There is little doubt but what such a study group would well pay for itself and more, too.

If the worker is hired by a firm If the worker is hired by a firm that has less than eight employees, the employer would be called upon for four successive years to con-tribute \$157.50 for an employee earning \$3,000 a year, or 252 for the employee earning \$4,500 a year. Thereafter the unemployment con-pensation rate could decline to a minimum of 1 per cent, making a total minimum of \$97.50 by the employer.

These taxes are accounted for by the following proposed social security benefits
Old-age insurance, now tinanced by a 1 per cent tax on both the employee and employer, would rise to 1.5 per cent on July 1, 1949. This tax would apply to fadividual income up to \$4800 instead of \$3000 as at present. Coverage would be broadened to include farmers, farm workers, dectors, small business
